

On this Feast Day of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, 50 students from our school will receive Our Lord Jesus Christ in Holy Communion for the first time. May Holy Communion bring them much healing, peace and joy.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross shows the power of God, to change everything and reversing everything to God's ways. Death and torture by crucifixion on a cross, has roots from impalement in Assyrian and Babylonian times. The Roman army perfected it as a form of terror, to anyone who would appose Roman Empire power. The Cross is an instrument of capital punishment, like other forms of instruments, the electric chair, hanging, lethal injection, guillotine, shooting, stoning and gassing. The strange thing is, you don't see people wearing these other types of instruments of death as jewellery, like wearing the cross. Only the cross is wore on necks, ears, chest and all parts of the body as jewellery and tattoos.

Why? Because it is now a symbol of love not death.

God has redeemed the cross by the death of Jesus on the Cross. The cross is no longer a place of suffering, pain, humiliation, bitterness, isolation and death but a place of hope, prayer, praise, reconciliation, peace, and love. God has turned darkness into light, death to life, hatred into forgiveness in Jesus on the Cross. God has accomplished this power by the Cross of Jesus.

That is why we have today's Feast Day to celebrate the power of the Cross.

The Cross is used as a weapon against evil and Satan.

It casts them out and drives them out of people and places.

We place the cross on ourselves by making the sign of the Cross on our body, to impart the power of the Cross on our lives before prayer and Mass. In this sense, the Cross is the first prayer and the most powerful prayer asking for forgiveness and redemption.

This Sunday's reading, emphasises the healing power of the Cross.

The healing power of the Cross, comes from what happened on the Cross where Our Saviour died for all people. Jesus's Sacrifice changes everything in the spiritual realm. This sacrifice is given in the form of his Body and Blood which we can receive, by eating his Body and drinking His Blood. Hail the Cross where Our Lord Jesus died for us.



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

LIFTED UP

Today's Feast moves us away from our usual journey through Luke's Gospel. Instead, our focus is with John's Gospel. We are in a different world. John 3 concerns the engagement which Jesus has with Nicodemus, a Jewish leader and, as we learn at the Gospel's end, a potential disciple. In this chapter, the evangelist seeks to reflect upon Jesus' origins. John affirms that Jesus, God's Word and source of Wisdom, is from God. He 'came down from Heaven'. Jesus is God's exalted heavenly and human presence. He will be 'lifted up', that is, in John's story of Jesus' passion and death, he will be 'lifted up' on the cross and will be 'lifted up' in exaltation by the Father in resurrection. Jesus' death is also his exaltation.

In today's Gospel, the evangelist draws on the imagery of the fashioned bronze serpent that Moses 'lifts up', that we hear today in the first reading from the Book of Numbers. The serpent figure rescues the suffering Israelites. For John, this, too, is Jesus' quest: to rescue and bring eternal life to suffering humanity. John's passage exudes hope and divine communion with humanity and creation. God loves the 'cosmos' so much that God's very being and expression in the Word, Jesus, suffers for it. This word, 'cosmos', comprises the whole of creation, including humanity.

Palpable optimism permeates this Gospel passage. For John, God wants nothing or anyone to be 'lost'. All are found in the Word enfleshed in Jesus. God's community with creation and humanity is sealed and eternal. This is such a rich Gospel for today's Feast. Every line deserves meditation.

HEALING FROM THE CROSS. The bronze serpent on a standard is a well known symbol of the medical profession. Its origins go back to the time when God healed the repentant Israelites in the wilderness through a bronze serpent that Moses fashioned and placed on a standard. In today's Gospel, Jesus applies this image to his own crucifixion. By being lifted up on the cross he will bring healing and eternal life to all who believe in him.


