Dear friends,

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I have come to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were blazing already! There is a baptism I must still receive, and how great is my distress till it is over!

We have the glimpse of what motivates Jesus from within, the passion that directs his life to end his life on a cross, fire. This fire is God's love. God's presence in the Burning Bush with Moses is a reminder how glorious God's presence is. Fire burns and consumes everything in touches and turns it into itself. We do well to let God's love consume us. How this is achieved is following Jesus, in suffering love. Suffering love, is the fire the world needs. The saints before us, changed the world with suffering love, with fire.

The world too has its own fire that consumes those who touch it.

But, this fires burns differently to God's fire. It consumes us in a way that destroys and kills, while God's fire of love burns in a way that uplifts and restores our life. We lose our life in the world's fire but gain our life in God's fire, either way, we burn up as a sacrifice to Satan or God, we just need to recognise this truth.

St Paul talks about the race before us.

What race is he talking about, because many people don't even know that they are in a race? We know about the human 'race' which is usually understood as the human species.

St Paul talks about another race which we should be conscious of, the race to die for God, a race to love, a race to eternity and where their is no second prize.

Let's look to the Cross, Second Tree of Life that burns with the fire of God's love, in the flesh of Jesus. A fire that does not exclude us from the Garden of Eden, from Paradise, but invites us into itself to be perfect praise and love to the Father.

BAPTISMAL COMMITMENT

Over these Sundays we continue to steep ourselves in Luke's journey teaching. Over Chapters 9 to 19, Luke offers readers teaching about discipleship and fidelity amid the struggles that they experience in their Greco-Roman world. One of them is the struggle to live out authentic discipleship as Jesus' followers when the temptation is otherwise.

In today's Gospel, Jesus offers this late first century audience a sobering reminder. Faithful discipleship is not easy. It will come at a cost and struggle. It will touch the very heart of life. Jesus looks towards his passion. This is the 'baptism' that he will undergo. But the very mention of 'baptism' in the Gospel's opening words reminds listeners that their baptism connects them to Jesus. They, too, will suffer - not because this is God's intent or 'will' (which some even today think) but because of the very nature of the life of discipleship lived within the particular social and cultural context of their world. Baptismal commitment does not, then, equal tranquillity and a life of ease. These matters have already been reflected upon over the last few Sundays. For some, the struggle to remain true to one's baptismal commitment will affect even core relationships. This is seen in the divisions experienced in Luke's day within households. The shocking nature of Jesus' words would be felt by Gospel listeners. The family household and its internal relationship were the building blocks for a secure society with the Greek (and Jewish) world. Baptismal fidelity to Jesus will at times be a struggle and may even cause family division and conflict.

The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Ieremiah sank.
